Greetings dear Vintage Adventure @ Home friends,



Welcome to your December 24 Vintage Adventure@Home booklet. This bumper issue includes lots of puzzles and fun items to help fill some of the hours which may seem rather long and lonely for several of us.

This Christmas our theme is 'glad tidings', taken from the announcement by the angels to the shepherds. We explore some of the features of Jesus' birth and His significance for us all, and why Jesus' coming is glad tidings or good news.

But Who is Jesus? The Bible makes clear that Jesus is so very much more than a prophet, teacher or great leader. Jesus is God. As we read in the Worship section, Mary's son Jesus was born, because of a direct initiative from God. Joseph made absolutely no contribution to His birth whatsoever. The uniqueness of this event is that Mary was a virgin, and Joseph had no union with her before the conception nor until after the Child was born. The New Testament describes Jesus as 'in very nature God'. Have you ever thought that He did not come into existence as we do, at the moment of our conception and later our birth, since He already existed and had done so for all eternity?

Why does it matter that Jesus is God? Because only God can reconcile us humans to God. It is also important that Jesus is fully human as well as fully divine. Lots of us have a rather idyllic picture of the Baby Jesus. We forget that Jesus intentionally came to our earth, with a purpose to fulfil and that He grew to adulthood, in order to carry that out on our behalf when He gave His life for us.

God becoming man in Jesus Christ is the greatest mystery in the Bible, something our brains simply can't fathom. Because Jesus came, lived a perfectly holy life, died voluntarily in our place, and was raised from the dead, we can have a new relationship with God, in the way intended at Creation. And that IS 'good news'!

So we pray that whatever your circumstances, Christmas will be a time when you encounter the Lord Jesus Christ personally. May God bless you this Christmas and in the year to come.

The Birth of Jesus Foretold

In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendent of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favoured. The Lord is with you." Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call Him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David, and He will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; His kingdom will never end."

Reflection



Note that it is **God** Who took the step of sending the angel Gabriel to Mary who was preparing for her marriage to Joseph. The name Jesus means Saviour and tells us something of the purpose of Jesus' coming to earth. He has come to be our Rescuer and to solve the problem of our estrangement from God.

We are utterly amazed Father God, our Creator, that You care **so** much for us that You put in place a plan to sort things out for us by sending help to this troubled earth, in the Person of Your Son Jesus, Who is equally God with You and the Holy Spirit.

The Birth of Jesus

So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.

Reflection

This well-known carol paints a somewhat rosy and sentimental picture of Jesus in the manger! Bethlehem was so overcrowded with folk coming to register for the Roman census, that Mary and Joseph had to make do with a barn or outhouse along with the animals and this is where Jesus' birth took place. Even though the earthly Jesus came from these extremely lowly beginnings, He was no ordinary baby. A gift from God to His mother, Mary, born not through Joseph but by the Holy Spirit, He was (and is!) special indeed.

Prayer

As we think of Jesus' birth in the stable, we pray for all homeless people out on our streets, for mothers across the world, and for those who are bereaved or separated from families and loved ones at this Christmas time. We pray for ourselves that in those moments when we feel lonely or down, we may appreciate God's generous gift of His Son Jesus. Help us to trust Him and the hope He brings, remembering that nothing can separate us from the love of God.
Amen.



The Angels Appear To The Shepherds

And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. Advent

Perhaps you remember taking part in a nativity play at school or watching a child or grandchild excitedly dress up as Mary or Joseph. Does anyone remember singing Christmas carols outside a neighbour's house and maybe getting the giggles half way through.....? Maybe you've had a relative come to stay at Christmas and all the extra work that entailed, making up beds; buying extra food. You try to find just the right gift for a neighbour or friend and then you think, "I wonder if I should have sent a card to the person I used to work with or that 'old' friend.....?" Phew! I feel exhausted just thinking about all there is to do.



BUT hold on a minute – is that all there is to December? There must be more, surely.....

O come, O come Emmanuel

Advent means arrival or coming. The birth of the Messiah was promised in the Old Testament and was anticipated by God's people for a very long time. Each year Advent runs for the four Sundays leading up to Christmas Eve. Many of you will be familiar with the lighting of candles on an Advent wreath.

Traditionally they are lit, one for each Sunday. They symbolise hope, peace, joy, and love.



- ◇ Our **HOPE**, as Christians, is that, just as Jesus came into the world, He will also return one day.
- ◇ The angels who appeared to the shepherds announced **PEACE** to the world.
- ◇ The Bible tells us that God **LOVED** us and sent His Son to show us how to **LOVE** others.
- ◇ The wise men were full of **JOY** when they saw the star because they knew that it would lead them to someone special.

Today, we need to know hope, to feel God's peace and love and to experience the joy that knowing Jesus brings.

I'm sure you will remember hearing Christmas hymns and carols being sung. Maybe when you were children you saw Carollers in the streets, often carrying lit lanterns that twinkled in the darkness, singing and bringing cheer to anyone listening. I'm sure you will have your favourites.

One of our best loved carols is 'Once in Royal David's City.'





Once in Royal David's City stood a lowly cattle shed.
Where a mother laid her baby in a manger for His bed.
Mary was that mother mild, Jesus Christ her little child.

He came down to earth from heaven, Who is God and Lord of all,

And so Advent becomes a time of waiting for the promise of what is to come, an expectation of a future revelation.

In John 14:3 Jesus tells us that He will come again. We can expect that, just as Old Testament prophets told us that He would come, a fact that we celebrate at Advent and Christmas, Jesus Himself tells us that He will come back. Advent then becomes a time for us to prepare for that glorious promise, when Jesus will, one day, return to renew all things. What a wonderful promise to anticipate.

This Advent as we remember why Jesus came and look forward to His coming again, my prayer is from Psalm 73:8,

*“But as for me, it is good for me to draw near to God; I have made the Lord
GOD my place of safety and put my trust in Him.”*

Perhaps you too can make this a prayer, your Advent prayer.

Christ's Coming



Christmas is here; the shops have been proclaiming this since September, with their trees and lights and tinsel. All this at a time when the world is tearing itself apart with wars and ruthless dictatorships, persecution, droughts and famine; millions of people have been forced to flee, and are living in sprawling refugee camps. The baby born in Bethlehem makes a cosy subject for cards, but seems to have little relevance for our suffering world.

We need to see Christmas in a wider perspective. It was a unique moment in God's plan to save the world. He entered without a fanfare, but instead through a humble village home in a remote corner of a hostile empire. He wasn't simply a messenger, it was God Himself, entering the womb of a teenage virgin, to unite Himself for ever with humankind. That was Act 1 of the drama.

The baby grew up to be a prophet and teacher; He claimed much more, to be the Son of God, equal with God Himself. It was for this "blasphemy" that He was rejected and killed. A failure? No, because on the third day He rose, and lives to offer pardon, peace and hope to all who receive Him. He reigns eternal with the Father, overruling history, working out His plan. The world is in a mess because men won't accept His authority, but in His chosen time He will return, to establish justice, a kingdom where love rules, and even nature is restored.

We call this **Advent**, the return of Christ. This is our **hope** when all else seems dark. As the early church prayed, "Come Lord Jesus, Maranatha."

Lo, He comes with clouds descending,
Once for favoured sinners slain,
Thousand thousand saints attending
Swell the triumph of His train:
Alleluia!
God appears on earth to reign.

Christmas Trivia

1. The historical King Wenceslas mentioned in the popular Christmas carol was in fact only the Duke of Bohemia (today's Czech Republic).
2. The real St. Nicholas was a bishop in the town of Myra in Turkey in the early 4th century. Dutch settlers suggested he might be associated with the giving of Christmas gifts. Later the tradition of St. Nicholas was taken to America where he became known as Santa Claus.
3. 'Silent Night' was composed by Joseph Mohr. It was first sung as part of a church service in Oberndorf, Austria. The guitar was the instrument chosen instead of the traditional organ because the organ bellows had been damaged by mice!

4. The custom of displaying a wreath on the front door was borrowed from the Romans, who wished each other 'good health' by exchanging branches of evergreens. It then became the custom to bend the evergreens into a ring and hang on doorways.
5. The first commercial Christmas card was designed and sold in London in 1843 by Sir Henry Cole. It featured a scene of a family gathered around a table, with the message "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You."
6. In many European countries, including Germany and Austria, it is traditional to hide a small pickle ornament in the Christmas tree. The first child to find the pickle on Christmas morning receives an extra gift or good luck for the coming year.
7. The popular Christmas carol "Jingle Bells" was originally written for Thanksgiving, not Christmas. It was composed by James Lord Pierpont in 1857 for a Thanksgiving programme at his church in Savannah, Georgia.
8. The song "White Christmas" by Irving Berlin is the best-selling single of all time, with over 50 million copies sold worldwide. It was first performed by Bing Crosby in the 1942 film "Holiday Inn."
9. The custom of decorating Christmas trees originated in Germany in the 16th century. The trees were decorated with candles, apples, nuts, and other ornaments to represent the Garden of Eden. The tradition spread to other parts of Europe and eventually to the United States.
10. The popular Christmas song "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" was created by a copywriter for the department store Montgomery Ward in 1939 as a marketing gimmick to encourage children to buy colouring books.

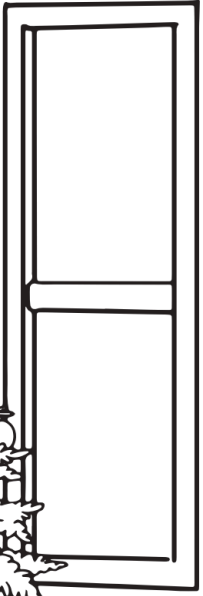

of nature.*

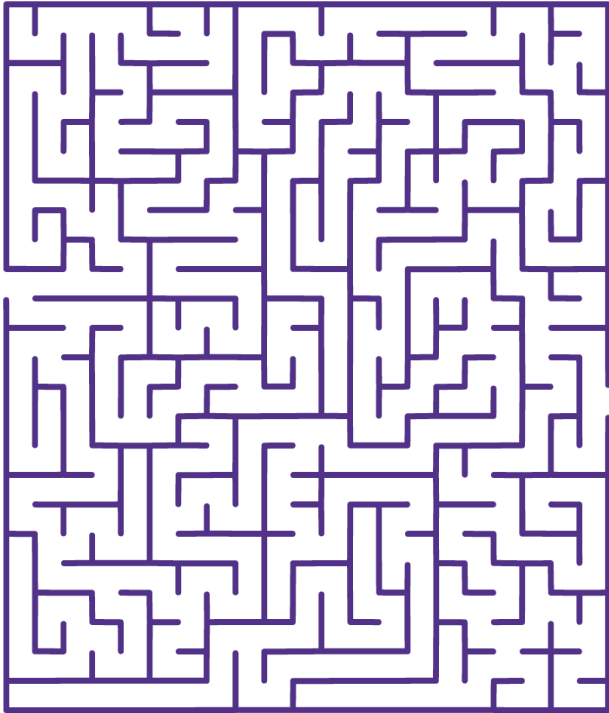
