Time, like an ever rolling stream,
Bears all its sons away.
They fly forgotten, as a dream
Dies at the opening day.

O God, our help in ages past,
Our hope for years to come,
Be Thou our guard while life shall last
And our eternal home.

#### **Prayer**

Heavenly Father, we thank You for bringing us to the beginning of a new year. We look back across the year just gone. It has both sad and happy events in it. We know that You care about both.

Sometimes we have done the right thing and sometimes we have not.

Help us to be positive in our words and actions, to affirm the good in others and to stand up against things that are wrong. ## Reflection



Have you ever wondered about the background to some of our favourite hymns? O *God our Help in ages past* (mentioned in our Worship) is based on parts of Psalm 90. The Psalms are Hebrew poetry, using picture language and devices such as similes. Thought to be the first psalm written, this is not by David but Moses.

Significantly, both hymn and psalm **start with God**. The Hebrew used is **Adonai, Sovereign Lord**, which describes God's majesty. This is not any god but the One True God Who has been faithful over generations.

Moses begins with praise of God, reminding Him of the way in which He had been a refuge for the Israelites from their beginnings with Abraham to the present. 'You have been our dwelling place for generations' – the Hebrew means refuge and shelter. As



wandering nomads moving with huge flocks, the Israelites were in constant need of protection.

Isaac Watts too looks back to generations before and forward to whatever is to come. With the words, 'O God our Help in ages past, our Hope for years to come,' he reminds us that our greatest help is always from God almighty, in Whom we can place complete trust for the unknown future of 2025.

Using imagery from Moses' psalm Watts describes God as somewhere to hide,



a place of protection where we can rest secure. Ultimately, whatever it may feel like, God IS in complete control.

Why can we have such confidence? 'Before the mountains were brought forth,

Or ever You had formed the earth and the world, Even from everlasting to everlasting, You are God.' The mountains Moses spotted on his journey reminded him of the eternal, unchangeable nature of God. So Watts writes, 'From everlasting Thou art God, to endless years the same.'

What a relief it is that our God is not fickle and unpredictable but totally dependable – as we saw in our 2024 reflections on Creation, before anything existed, God was. We can rely on Him for whatever the new year brings.

In contrast, we humans are transitory beings, as both psalm and hymn point out. Looking around we see that even the richest and most important in human terms, are not exempt from sickness and death. We have seen examples of our frailty even in our own Royal Family in 2024.

The psalm continues: 'For a thousand years in Your sight are like yesterday when it is past, and like a watch in the night. You carry them away like a flood; they are like a sleep.' Hebrew poetry often repeats the same idea using different words, so Moses goes on: 'In the morning they are like grass which grows up: In the morning it flourishes and grows up; In the evening it is cut down and withers.'

We live for a short time and then die, and all our achievements fade in the

collective memory just as we forget the details of our dreams as we awake. 'Time, like an everrolling stream, bears all its sons away; they fly, forgotten, as a dream dies at the opening day.'



Indeed, God's perception of time and its passing is quite unlike ours: 'a thousand ages in Thy sight are like an evening gone.' Using an illustration from the psalm, Watts refers to soldiers on guard on the city walls, longing for the

coming of the new day. The hours on duty drag and seem endless, but in fact are very few and soon pass. Our lives are similarly as fleeting.

Moses ends the psalm by asking God to grant us the wisdom to grasp the shortness of life: 'So teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom.'

None of us knows what's going to happen, neither to our nation and wider world, nor to ourselves, family and friends. Thus the final verse of Watts' hymn picks up the theme from his opening lines, of God as our great Helper and Saviour. In the form of a prayer that God might continue to bless us.

'... be Thou our Guide while troubles last, and our eternal Home', it reiterates the plea to turn to God for the help we so urgently need. Will we take up this challenge in 2025?

#### **Isaac Watts**

Isaac Watts was the eldest of nine children born to a respected non-conformist Southampton schoolmaster on 17 July 1674. He began to learn Latin at the age of four, as well as Greek and Hebrew, taught by Mr. Pinhorn, headmaster of King Edward VI Grammar



School. He was so gifted – writing verses at the age of seven – that a Southampton doctor together with friends, offered to sponsor an Oxbridge education for ordination in the Church of England. Isaac declined, and at sixteen in 1690, entered the Dissenting Academy at Stoke Newington under Mr. Thomas Rowe, an independent Congregational minister. In 1698 Watts became assistant minister of the Independent Church, Berry Sreet, London, becoming pastor in 1702. The next six years were spent at Stoke Newington, as tutor to the son of an eminent Puritan, Sir John Hartopp. The theological and philosophical study required, became the foundation for his later numerous publications.

In 1705 his Horae Lyricae, a collection of hymns and poems, was published, many sung from manuscripts in Southampton Chapel. In 1712, he accepted an invitation to visit Sir Thomas Abney, at Abney Park, where he lived for 36 years until his death, preaching as often as his failing health permitted.

Isaac Watts was a prolific writer, publishing over 800 hymns typically sung after he had preached a particular sermon, and relating to the text he had been speaking about. His theological and philosophical fame was considerable, such that the University of Edinburgh bestowed on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1728. For many years both the University of Oxford and schools used his major works on theology and logic as popular textbooks.

Isaac Watts died on 25 November 1748, and was buried at Bunhill Fields, a Puritan resting place in London, whereas Westminster Abbey has a memorial bust.



Visitors to Southampton can admire an imposing Victorian



statue of Watts in East Park, opposite the Southampton Art Gallery and explore the Isaac Watts Memorial United Reformed Church in Winchester Road, Southampton. In addition, the imposing Civic Centre tower clock with nine bells, as well as striking the hour on the largest bell weighing 58 cwt, chimes the tune of Watt's famous hymn at 8am, 12 noon and 4pm!

#### Facing a New Year

Does the coming of 2025 daunt you? As we start a new year, there are just so many unknowns. The world around us is so very troubled, with wars and conflict seemingly almost everywhere. I find the words in the following poem resonate with me, even



though referring to the period at the start of World War II.

#### The Gate of the Year

It was Christmas, 1939 and Great Britain had been at war with Nazi Germany since September. In his Christmas broadcast, King George VI said words which could apply to us today towards the end of the first quarter of the 21st century.

".... Among all free peoples the love of peace is profound, for this alone gives security to the home. But true peace is in the hearts of men, and it is the tragedy of this time that there are powerful countries whose whole direction and policy are based on aggression and the suppression of all that we hold dear for humankind...."

Measuring his words carefully, King George VI spoke from the heart: "A new year is at hand. We cannot tell what it will bring. If it brings peace, how thankful we shall all be. If it brings us continued struggles, we shall remain undaunted."

Towards the end of his nine minute broadcast, the King added,
"I feel that we may all find a message of encouragement in the
lines which, in my closing words, I would like to say to you."

He then read a short extract from a poem given him by his 13 year old daughter, Princess Elizabeth. Written in 1908 by British poet Minnie Louise Haskins, its original title was 'God knows'.

I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year,
'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'

And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness,

And put your hand into the Hand of God.

That shall be better than light, and safer than a known way.'



The King finished his address by saying, "May that Almighty hand guide and uphold us all."

A reminder that God **does** know what we are going to face and has promised to never fail nor forsake us, if we place our trust in Him. Worth a try in 2025?




January 9<sup>th</sup> 1969 First trial flight of Concorde supersonic jetliner in Bristol, England.



January 31<sup>st</sup> 1961 Ham the Chimp travels into outer space. The chimpanzee survived the US Mercury






